

Confidential Information

Information is confidential based on a statute, court rule or court order, or other law. It must be redacted from public documents.

There is no exhaustive list of all information that may be confidential under state or federal law. This law can include state statutes and regulations. It also can include federal statutes and regulations. Additionally, it may include state court rules and federal court rules. For help, you may want to consult with an attorney.

The Missouri court rules list some examples of information that may be confidential. These examples include, but are not limited to:

- Personal Identification information
 - Social security numbers
 - Driver's license numbers
 - State identification numbers
 - Taxpayer identification numbers
 - Passport numbers
 - Names, addresses and contact information of
 - Informants
 - Victims
 - Witnesses
 - Persons protected under
 - Restraining orders
 - Protection orders
 - Dates of birth
 - Names of individuals known to be minors
 - Case numbers of
 - Confidential records
 - Expunged records
 - Sealed records
 - Any other personal identification numbers
- Financial information numbers or passwords
 - Institution accounts (Banks, Credit Unions, etc.)
 - Credit cards
 - Debit cards

 - Medical records
 - Employment history
 - Financial records
 - Proprietary information
 - Trade secrets
